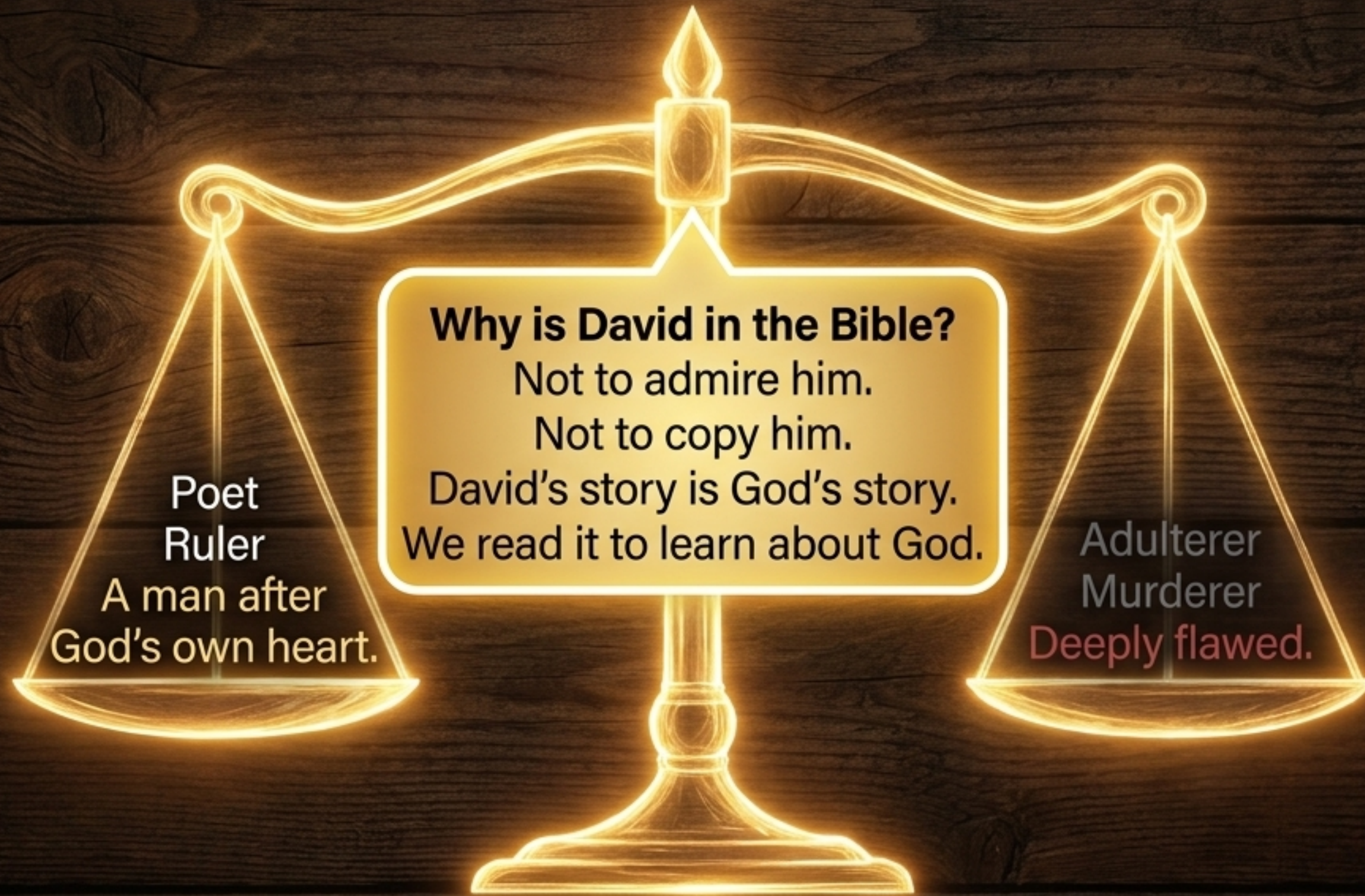

Why is David in the Bible?
Not to admire him.
Not to copy him.
David's story is God's story.
We read it to learn about God.

Adulterer
Murderer
Deeply flawed.

The Collision of Two Kingdoms

Context: David is settled, secure, and decides to “do something for God.”

The Divine Disruption

God did not ask David to build Him a house. Instead, God dismantles our assumptions to reveal three vital truths about His nature:

1. He does not need us.

2. He does not follow our plans.

3. He does not abandon us.

Insight 1: God Doesn't Need Us

“The God who made the world... is not served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives everyone life and breath and all things.”

— Acts 17:24-25

Core Takeaway:

He is entirely self-sufficient. This wrecks our pride. We can never put God in our debt; we come empty-handed to be humble recipients of His gifts.

Insight 2: God Doesn't Follow Our Plans

Our Plans

The LORD's Purpose

The Reality

You can make many plans, but the LORD's purpose will prevail. (Proverbs 19:21)

The Comfort

All things work together for the good of those who love God... predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son. (Romans 8:28-29)

Core Takeaway: When anxiety feels unbearable, find peace here:
God is working His better plan to conform us to Christ.

Insight 3: God Doesn't Abandon Us

*I will establish the throne of his kingdom forever.
... Your house and kingdom will endure before
me forever.*

— 2 Samuel 7:13, 16

FOREVER

The Anomaly: Solomon did not reign forever. The temple he built was destroyed in 586 BC. No human descendant could fulfill this promise.

Knowing God Means Knowing Ourselves

Absolute Reliance

While God does not need us, we need Him—desperately. We bring nothing to the table.

Absolute Grace

We are all deeply flawed (like David), in desperate need of the saving grace and forgiveness found only in Jesus.

Absolute Security

Our future is guaranteed and glorious. Because God works His plan, we will ultimately be like Christ, sharing in His eternal glory.
